VICTORY FOR ENGLAND

New boys find Irish browns in Spring International

NGLAND comfortably won the Spring International, held on beautiful Lough Owel in Co. Westmeath, despite having seven new caps in the team, reports Paul Canning. Their 51 fish weighing 52lb 12.2oz was nine fish ahead of second-placed Scotland with 43 fish for 43 lb 5.8

In practise, Lough Owel's 2,500 acres offered little shelter from a freezing east wind, which kept catches down and competitors guessing about the outcome. With boats spread far apart, and tight-lipped competitors reluctant to talk in the bar afterwards of poor catches, teams were all speculating on the outcome of match day

Low pressure, frosts at night, the incredible clarity of the water and the very rich bottom feed further conspired to push trout deep. By mid-May there should have been a good lake olive hatch on Lough Owel, but in the cold winds there was only a trickle to tempt the odd fish up. With lake olive nymphs active below the surface, the west side of the lake was favoured by many.

Floating lines proved to be far less successful than expected. Many of the competitors opted for pulling flies very fast under the surface, using a variety of traditional Irish flies, many heavily dressed and fished on various intermediates.

Many reported missing numbers of fish, as the fast and wary Lough Owel browns nipped at flies moved too fast. The England team opted for smaller, slimmer flies, fishing them more slowly and somewhat deeper than most, using WetCel ones, twos and sink tips. They also employed slow nymphing at depth which

caught a number of fish.

With incredibly clear water, anglers used the water colour as a guide to the ideal fishing depth. Where the colour changed from mid to dark green was judged to be a good depth, this was around eight to 12 feet.

Many in the England team were convinced that finer nylons had improved catches during practise. They also concentrated on fishing whatever calm water could be found, including Bog Bay and the Mount Murray end of the Lough where trout were feeding on midges.

MATCH DAY

ON match day, competitors generally favoured fishing the west side of the lake. Drifts were into the Pumphouse, the Frewin Shore, and the Corn Field. One of the few drifts off the east shore was out from Brabazon's Point and across the shallows.

Lady's Island and the surrounding shallows was a productive area but because it was near the boat launching point and easy to fish en route to other areas, it got too much attention.

Good areas too were patches of reeds on the west shore. Fish were shrimping among the old stems, often laying alongside the reeds which grew from a good depth. With an onshore wind though, anglers often had only moments in the best water before they were blown on. Engine noise and excessive drifting soon spooked

The freezing east wind that had plagued practise moderated in the afternoon to allow modest hatches of olives. Competitors fishing in the right areas discovered the trout responding to the hatching duns, and a switch to appropriate dries including green hoppers and CDC patterns brought valuable fish.

There were some very big fish on the move in the calm slicks. One was hooked by Bill Burleigh of England, who played it for ten minutes before it slipped the hook at the net.

Not surprisingly, successful patterns focused on Olive imitations. Two effective flies used by Drennan Team England were a twinkle-tailed Olive pattern and a hackled Hare's Ear. Other traditional flies that produced were the Black Pennells, simple Buzzers, Blae & Black, Dabblers, Bumbles, Sooty Olives, Olive Bumbles, Spring Favourite and the June Fly.

This was a memorable match, fished in a great spirit of friendship and excitement. As ever the Irish were wonderful hosts.

The England rods who finished in the top four and keep their places for the Autumn International are: Paul Canning, Clive Collier, Ed Foster and Richard Sandford. This match is to be hosted by Wales in September.

HERE WAS PLENTY OF ACTION for the 57 anglers from England and Wales competing in the final of the Airflo Classic.

The standard of angling was high and the stage set for a very competitive and exciting match. The competition is pegged with each angler moving 10 pegs every 40 minutes. Only the first two fish are killed and weighed with all other fish released.

Conditions were good, much better than previous years. But while the sun was shining, there was a cold north-westerly blowing. Most anglers tackled up with intermediates and leaded patterns to get their flies down beneath the cold surface water to where, hopefully, the fish were.

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with the wind blowing into them they did not produce fish. Instead, pegs one to three started well, with Ray Cramp (Packington) taking full advantage of his first session on peg two, with four rainbows. As sport slowed down at one end of the lake, at the top of Woodstock pool pegs 45 to 48 were hotting up.

Adam Garrett took two fish on peg 47 using an orange leadhead, increasing his total to four but was unlucky to lose a number of fish. The last change before lunch saw the height of the action with Blackburn angler Nigel Haigh moving onto peg 46, taking six rainbows, using an Olive Tadpole fished on a Mastery clear intermediate.

Pegs 10 to 18 were favoured by many, but



Match Scene

Close finish at Trawsfynydd

Autumn Home International ONE OF the closest finishes in recent years added excitement to the finale of the Autumn International at Llyn Trawsfynydd in Wales. Only 9lb and seven fish separated all four teams! Scotland were worthy winners. Having practised hard and working well as a team their 49 fish for 68lb 15½oz was six fish ahead of hosts Wales who weighed in 43 fish for 63lb 15\%oz. England came in third with two more fish than Wales but their catch hit their scales at 62lb 3\%oz. Ireland were fourth with 42 fish for 59lb 14oz.

Top individual rod and winner of the coveted Brown Bowl was Toby Bradshaw from
Ireland, taking seven fish for
11lb 7½oz. He caught on a
Golden Olive Bumble and Viva
variants, fished on a WetCel II
and Drennan 4lb Sub-surface
nylon. Toby found flies pulled
slowly to be most effective.

In second place was Paul
Canning of England with eight
fish for 10lb 4½oz He
swapped lines ten times during
the match to keep in touch
with fish as conditions
changed, catching on an AirCel
Ultra 3 floater, a Stillwater
Intermediate and a WetCel 1.
Effective flies were Hare's Ear
variants, Mallard & Claret,
Pearly Wickham's and the Blae
& Black. Other flies to feature
in the match were variants of

the Diawl Bach and the Haul-a-Gwynt.

Llyn Trawsfynydd is a 11,000 acre lake with many fish holding areas. Competitors found in practise that even the smallest ripple would often put rising fish down. Both pulling tactics and slow nymphing with small flies on intermediates were found to be effective for many. One of the keys to catching fish seemed to be to get the fishing level absolutely right. Despite the crystal clear water, a dark bottom made assessing the depth difficult and during practise competitors struggled to find the best line to use. Many opted to use a clear Stillwater.

The Magnox Electric PLC sponsored the event, meeting

BEWL PROVES A TOUGH TEST

THE ENGLISH LochStyle Fly-Fishing
Championships at Bewl
Water proved to be a
demanding test for the 103
finalists, writes Paul Canning.
A blustery north-westerly
wind during the previous few
days had slowed sport and
many found it hard to get to
grips with Bewl's trout in the
bright sun and wind.

Winner Mike Tinnion, from Keswick in Cumbria, was the only competitor to get it right. His 12 fish bag weighing 16lb 9oz came mostly to a palmered Hare's Ear variant fished on an intermediate line. He favoured the Chingley Wood area.

In second place with eight fish was Paul Miller from Peterborough. He got many of his eight fish on a Pearly Wickham's at the top of Hook Straight. In third place was John Ieldon from Haynes in Bedfordshire, with seven fish for 10lb 6½oz.

Qualifying bags came from many parts of the lake. Favoured areas included Chingley Corner, Ferry Point, the Nose, Hook Straight, Seven Pound Creek, Hook House to Bryants Inlet, Bewl Straight and Dunsters Bay.

A wide range of flies took fish, including Hare's Ear Nymphs, Slim Buzzers, Pearly Wickham's, Soldier Muddlers, assorted dries, Cat's Whisker variants and Green Nymphs.

The use of slow sink WetCel Stillwater and Fast Glass lines combined with a figure of eight or slow draw retrieve was the key for many competitors.

There were the usual stories of competitors qualifying to fish for England after years of trying. Paul Weiss was one. He took 20th place, catching four fish for 6lb 10½oz, squeezing Robert Dadd – whose five fish bag weighed only a half ounce less than Paul's – into first reserve place!

Despite the tough conditions, there were only 10 blanks among the 102 competitors. A total of 294 fish for a combined weight of 426lb 4oz gave a rod average of 2.8 fish. The match was sponsored by Fulling Mill and Southern Water Services.
